Dear City Council members:

Police Chief Rodriguez brought up a request for an armored vehicle to be used for civilian/police extraction during the May 21, 2024 City Hall meeting.

I believe the city council denied this request based upon cost, frequency of use, and the staff report. However, I am requesting that the tactical void highlighted by our new Chief be followed up and remedied at least with some kind of alternative cost effective solution, if possible.

To me, it seems important to have that extraction capacity because we have had shooting incidents in the past and have a current environment of national border breaches, terrorist infiltration, and complex coup activities that will continue to fester with a very explosive situation until final resolution is ultimately reached on a national level. Further, this council is actively promoting a huge increase in the city's commuter/housing population. More people always means more trouble. So, having appropriate security measures in place is like having a fence--it helps deter crime.
